FIDELINA GUERRA CAMEY
PARTICIPANT IN ABPD PROGRAMS SUPPORTED BY ALDEA

(TRANSLATED FROM SPANISH)

My name is Fidelina Guerra Camey, and I'm a mother, grandmother, and weaver from Tonajuyú, Chimaltenango. Over 15 years ago, I moved to Tonajuyú with my husband, but he left six years ago, leaving me to raise our five children on my own. Life was tough – I had no access to clean water, and I had to buy it from neighbors and walk long distances to the river to bathe. Our home was small and I cooked over an open fire with very little space, using a lot of firewood.

Things began to change when I joined ABPD's program. Through this program, I received clean water, a fuel-efficient stove, and a proper latrine. These changes made a huge difference. I no longer struggle to find water, and cooking is easier with less smoke. The stove also saves me time and firewood, which has freed up time for me to focus on weaving, helping me earn more income.

The training I received also empowered me to improve my family's nutrition. I now know how to give my children a balanced diet with vegetables, eggs, and herbs. This has made them healthier and stronger. I've learned to value myself and my family more, and I pass these lessons on to my daughter, who is now a mother, and to my grandchildren. I teach them the importance of nutrition, equality, and respecting the rights of both men and women.

Thanks to ABPD, my life and my children's health have improved. I'm grateful for the knowledge and resources we've received, and I hope my children can continue to benefit from these opportunities for a better future.



2024 RESULTSJULY 1, 2023 THROUGH JUNE 30, 2024

DURING OUR 2024 FISCAL YEAR, ALDEA SUPPORTED ASOCIACIÓN BPD IN WORKING WITH A TOTAL OF 1,297 FAMILIES IN 9 RURAL GUATEMALAN COMMUNITY GROUPS TO IMPROVE THEIR HEALTH AND WELLBEING. THESE ARE THE RESULTS THEY ACHIEVED.





567 women participated in empowerment workshops.



10 women program participants now hold communitylevel leadership roles.



102 men participated in Positive Masculinities workshops.



26 young people participated in youth engagement workshops.





528 women received nutrition training.



420 families began household agriculture projects.



91 participants received training in cultivation of basic grains.



368 Family planning consultations conducted.





3 water systems installed (Cojol Juyú, Tonajuyú, & Xiquín Sanahí), benefiting **711** families; construction began on **1** more (Panicuy) to benefit **46** families.



132 gray water filters installed.



76 sanitary latrines installed.



284 safe, efficient, vented cookstoves installed.






2024 EXPENDITURES


